Dear Parents and Carers,

Inspired by the children, we have had a week with lots of activities linked to safari animals. The children have enjoyed a safari adventure outside, by building their own jeep, singing around the campfire and navigating the treacherous assault course. With all this lovely weather, the children have explored sand and water play developing new skills. We introduced icing bags to Blue Groups playdough play which was brilliant for building up those hands and core muscles to squeeze the playdough out. In Red group this week, we have moved some furniture around to make a lovely big space for construction, small world and loose parts play. The space has been busy all week with children working as a team, talking, creating, problem solving, role playing, risk taking and having fun. All areas of learning can be covered within this great space.

"The best things to do to prepare your little ones for reading are probably things that you naturally do already anyway. Sing nursery rhymes, read stories, play 'I spy', talk! Doing all of these things will really give your little ones a great foundation for learning Phonics at School.

If your preschooler does show an interest in matching letters and sounds then that's great too but just know that it is absolutely not a requirement. If you are introducing a few letters and sounds then be sure to focus on the pure sounds of the letters rather than the letter names and start with lowercase rather than capitals."
